





Over the course of one week, I was filmed dancing by a wonderful team of friends in the locations of 40 past and present churches around Bethnal Green. The first in a series of projects celebrating aspects of Bethnal Green's rich history, I danced as a gesture of hope and possibility around the area I live.

My artwork has recently been about the role of land and how human activity on it creates meaning in specific places. My art intercepts those narratives and plays with them. Bethnal Green and its neighbouring areas are places where much has happened: silk weaving, boxing, the Blitz Spirit, the Salvation Army, the world's first social housing... are among many activities that have found home in Bethnal Green and which may form the subject of future projects. For these projects I wanted to create work around beauty in the area, drawing attention to it in the past and representing it back to the community.

This first project came about when I discovered how much of Bethnal Green's land had been used as Church space in recent history. My curiosity was sparked when I realised there used to be a church that could seat a thousand opposite my flat but is nowhere to be seen. In the 1840s Bishop Blomfield commissioned the building of 10 churches across Bethnal Green as a way to engage the fast growing working population of the area with the Christian faith. This population peaked in 1900 and then declined - church attendance with it - until the 1940s when many of these buildings were bombed during the Second World War. Some were re-built but by the 1970s eight of the ten had either been completely demolished or turned into flats. Alongside these churches there were a number of Anglican and University missions buildings that hosted chapels; and there are a range of other denominational churches across Bethnal Green today. Using a series of old maps and my bicycle, I chartered the exact locations of each demolished space so that I could dance in each one.

This project involves taking what has been, then re-energising it; marking out the land through a gesture that will become concrete in history by the simple fact that it will have happened. The work draws up and together the strange history of such a vast array of space set aside in the same small area for the same activity, many of which no longer exist. It draws attention to these spaces and gives them a second life through another continuous but different activity, and one that inherently holds life: dancing.

An unseen part of the project is the number of local people that I spent time with to allow this project to happen. I wanted to honour each space both for what it had been used for, and for what it is today. This meant spending time with fascinating and brilliant people across the community, discussing and sharing ideas. Many generous people made time to let me dance in their churches, offices or houses! I hope the work might be a gift to the local community, bringing attention to these people and places; celebrating an aspect of the vibrant life of Bethnal Green.
